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

ICT Co-Ord :

- raise standards in ICT

Learners:

Progression, Monitoring, Assessing and Evaluating

<u>Progression</u>

- All children develop and learn at their own pace.
- Progression is assured through a range of increasingly challenging activities covering all areas of ICT and embedded in the Northern Ireland Curriculum.
- All teachers are encouraged to use the CCEA Tasks as a marker for progression through the levels.
- Pupils in Year 4-7 have an opportunity to apply to become a Digital Leader and participate in training provided by Apple.

Monitoring

The ICT co-ordinator monitors:

- Planners to ensure continuity and progression.
- Pupils work saved in individual ICT portfolios and on the C2k system.
- Samples of work produced by each class teacher.
- With SMT, monitors the standard of and progress made by pupils through the examination of books, lessons observations and ICT portfolios.

Assessing

- Evidence gathered each year is assessed by the ICT Co-ordinator/SMT.
- SMT and teachers participate regularly in moderation sessions.
- The SeeSaw app is used to communicate to parents their child's learning whilst in school.

<u>Evaluating</u>

- The ICT Co-ordinator evaluates the use of ICT in teaching and learning and prepares a report for submission to the SMT/Board of Governors.
- ICT Co-ordinator evaluates planners and samples of work.
- Children reflect and evaluate their own skills and take part in the self-evaluation process (Self-Assessment/Peer Assessment).
